**PREPARATION:**

Students should read the applicable chapter before attending the scheduled lecture. Each lecture which begins a new chapter will open with a brief and simple quiz or with students turning in the homework assignment given during the previous lecture. In-class lectures will assume that students have read the chapters and accordingly will focus on expanding upon information contained in the textbook and answering students' questions. Not reading the chapters before attending class will significantly reduce the benefit which students may obtain by attending lectures.

**COURSE APPROACH:**

The major source of information will come from the lectures, cases, and textbook readings. However, we will include additional material as appropriate. **It will be essential** that you prepare for the lectures by reading the assigned material.

**QUIZZES & HOMEWORK:**

Homework assignments are posted at the class website. Quizzes take place at the beginning of the scheduled lecture and will be due approximately 5 minutes after class starts. There are no make-up quizzes or homework, and the lowest two scores will be “dropped”. If you miss a quiz or homework assignment **for any reason** it will be considered one of your two allowable drops. You may turn in a homework assignment by e-mail to the instructor only one time during the quarter, and it must be received by the instructor at least 1 hour prior to the beginning of the beginning of class on the date due.

**SIMULATIONS:**

There are two simulations. They are more in depth than a normal homework and similar to what is required to prepare for portions of the CPA exam. They are **due by the beginning of the class** period as indicated on page 1. There are no makeups. If you can not attend lecture on the date due, please make arrangements to have your assignment in the hands of the instructor no later than the beginning of the due date class time, or no credit will be given.

**EXAMS:**

The format of the exams may include multiple-choice, short-answer, exercise or problem type questions. You should pay close attention to the topics covered in lecture and for homework. Use your textbook to reinforce topics covered.

*For the midterms and final you will need the following:*

- Scantron (small green)
- Pencil for scantron. Pen for other questions. If a blue-book is completed in pencil, then re-grading will be impaired.
- Basic Calculator. NOTE, only a basic or financial calculator will be allowed. If a student brings a programmable calculator, they should plan to take the exam without one. (note: there are generally minimal computations necessary in this course)
